Judge tosses unionfriendly franchise rule

A new rule by the National Labor Relations Board that would have made it easier for millions of workers to form unions was blocked March 8 by a federal judge in Texas.

U.S. District Court Judge J. Campbell Barker ruled that the NLRB's new regulation would be "contrary to law" and that it was "arbitrary and capricious" in regard to how it would change the existing rule.

The current NLRB rule, adopted by a Trump-appointed, Republican-majority board in 2020, said companies with franchises - think McDonald's - aren't considered a joint employer since workers are directly employed by franchisees.

Of course, under such a setup, that greatly limits the legal exposure of the parent company in labor negotiations, with any worker actions taken against the employer only apply to individual franchises.

When the new NLRB rule was announced last October by a Biden-appointed majority, AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler said 'the point of the rule is simple – when workers negotiate for fair wages and working conditions, companies shouldn't be able to hide behind a subcontractor or staffing agency to deny us what we've rightfully earned. Today, too many employers use intermediaries like staffing firms or temp agencies to evade their responsibilities under the law. This rule ensures that union members can bargain with each company that has the power to make changes in the workplace."

The U.S. Chamber of Comnerce and other business groups sued to stop implementation of the rule, and went courtshopping to do so, bringing the case to the highly conservative federal court in the Eastern District of Texas to block the rule. And Judge Barker delivered for them. An appeal is likely.

"Under the 2023 final rule, contractors would be vulnerable to increased liability and risk, making them less likely to hire subcontractors, most of which are small businesses," said anti-union Associated Builders and Contractors Vice President Ben Brubeck.

The AFL-CIO's Shuler countered: "The rule is about basic common sense. The right to collectively bargain is nonexistent if the company that has the power to change workers' terms and conditions of employment, isn't negotiating with workers."

Anti-union firms seek to kill NLRB

Don't like NLRB rulings?

Then get rid of the NLRB. Notoriously anti-union companies like Trader Joe's, Amazon and Tesla have all been found responsible for unlawful, anti-union behavior by the National Labor Relations Board.

Now their lawyers are arguing that their union-busting, behaviors are legal because the NLRB itself is unconstitutional. They have filed joint cases with the NLRB and in federal district court to dismantle the NLRB, which administers labor law in the nation.

Seth Goldstein, an attorney who represents both the Amazon Labor Union and the labor group Trader Joe's United, said the cases are "very frightening."

"Since they can't defeat successful union organizing, they now want to just destroy the whole process," he said.



'Sustaining majority' for labor

Following are selected comments made March 5-6 by state lawmakers to delegates to the Michigan Building and Construction

Trades Council's 62nd Legislative Conference. State Rep. Will Snyder (D-Muskegon). "Fifteen months ago you helped make history to elect the first



'We expanded the Earned Income Tax Credit and rebranded it as the Working Families' Tax Credit. We repealed the retirement tax. We repealed right to work, and reinstated prevailing wage.


"And then we turned our attention to the budget, which was an historic budget that focused on the working people

of Michigan. "I want to leave with one message: all the work that we did, in one year, can be overturned in a matter of minutes. There's only one election that's more important than creating a new majority, and that's one that creates a sustaining majority for working people."

State Rep. John Fitzgerald (D-Wyoming). "We had 40 long years waiting for this moment. We earned this. Spreading the message that you the working people of Michigan deserve to have a majority who carries your voice into the Capitol dome each and every day. And it's a fragile moment. Without a sustaining majority, we have the opportunity to lose everything that we fought for, for another 10 to 20 years."

State Rep. Donavan McKinney (D-Detroit). Another issue is unemployment, we understand that you guys need support. First day I came into office I said I wanted to expand the unemployment benefit weeks. We

need to make sure that those unemployment benefits are extended and increased. \$363 a week – what the hell are you gonna do on \$363 a week? We are one of the few states in the country, especially in our region, who have it that low. We need to at least double that to compete with other states.



State Sen. Ed McBroom (R-Vulcan). In the Legislature, I find myself sometimes in no-man's land, trying to argue against one party who seems to push policies and promote ideas that make it harder to go to work, and increases regulations, without considering the costs of everyday people who do the work. And another party who constantly focus on paying people as little as possible.

"I just tend to believe that both parties have too far extremes on either of those perspectives at a time and I'm trying to find other colleagues to come to the middle and make good policies because we need good regulations. But we can't be over-regulated and we need to make sure that people have every opportunity to leverage their labor for the maximum value they can get for them. I'm often times left somewhere in the middle."

Senate Majority Leader Winnie Brinks (D-Grand Rapids). 'Back in 2012, the year I was first elected as state representative, I

was sitting in the House chamber when Republicans brought back right to work. So for me it was a bit of a full-circle moment to be able to be in a position of authority as Senate majority leader in 2023. One of our first priorities was to repeal Michigan's so-called right-to-work legislation.

'The 2012 law was passed without committee hearings and without recognition of the outcry coming from working people . By repealing it, we restored workers' rights in Michigan. This ensures that working folks have the

freedom to speak as one voice for better wages, better hours, for workplace safety and benefits. Allowing workers to organize is good for all Michiganders, whether they're part of a union or not. It uplifts the value of careers in the skilled trades." Lt. Gov. Garlin Gilchrist. "The fact that frankly so many of

your members are working right now is one of the biggest testaments to success of the work we've done together.

You did the organizing politically to make sure that we have the power to deliver the most pro-worker, pro-labor, pro-union Michigan Legislature in at least the past two generations. Gov. Gretchen Whitmer and I are excited to

work with this Democratic majority because we have more work to do. We might be in the first state that has actually restored workers' rights and workers' protections in almost 70 years to reinstate prevailing wage. We have a lot of stuff we need to erase from the previous Republican

administration." State Rep. Betsy Coffia (D-Traverse City). "So some of the other things that we've done with the majority you've helped deliver was reinstating prevailing wage, which I know was a very important issue. Workers should be paid a good, living wage, and that was something that the past administration had pulled back and eliminated. We were able to bring

back prevailing wage last year on all state projects. "There's a lot more work to do. I want to talk a bit about unemployment benefits. I know the

building trades in particular, you deal with cyclical work cycles, and sometimes there are periods of unemployment. And I am well aware under the Snyder Administration back in 2012 while we were protesting on the Capitol lawn, they cut the number of benefit weeks from 26 to 20.

We need to reinstate that, I fully support reinstating that back to 26 weeks and increasing the amount per week. I am well aware that our neighboring states have stronger unemployment benefits for those workers who are seasonally laid off. We need to make sure we are supporting our workers and their families who are seasonally laid off."

to find qualified workers, which is keeping more states from posting employment increases.'

The AGC said the construction industry added 23,000 jobs in February - the most since August - as a strong gain in employment at nonresidential contractors offset a small decline at residential firms.

U.S. construction employment in February totaled 8,162,000, seasonally adjusted, an increase of 23,000 or 0.3 percent from the upwardly revised January total. The sector has added 215,000 jobs during the past 12 months, a gain of 2.7 percent. Michigan currently employs 191,800 construction industry workers.

Meanwhile, the Dodge Data and Analytics' Momentum Index for U.S. construction dropped 1.4 percent in February, led by weaker building in office and health care construction.

"However," said a March 7 statement from Sarah Martin, associate director of forecasting for Dodge, "the index remains 25 percent higher than where it was just two years ago. Most other categories showed growth over the month and Dodge remains optimistic that nonresidential planning will stay elevated throughout 2024 alongside rising confidence in 2025 market condi-

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

total gut job. Some floors we're performing abatement, there's masonry work ongoing, other floors we're doing mechanical."


The day we visited, Feb. 7, was the first day of use for a buckhoist on the building's east face - a most welcome addition to a group of tradespeople who had been using a couple of regular building elevators for the ups and downs of moving themselves, tools and materials to their workplaces. How safety gets derailed

"Corporate crises consultants" (yes, there are such creatures) have patented a formula allowing their wrongdoing clients to champion reform while simultaneously killing it.

A classic case is now unfolding around last year's derailment of a two-mile-long Norfolk Southern freight train in East Palestine, Ohio.

The community's air, soil, water, and people suf-

fered a massive spill of toxic chemicals. So, following the corporate crisis script, Step One was for the CEO to offer "thoughts and prayers" for victims. Step Two: Reject corporate blame, but promise a "thorough investigation." Step Three: Magnanimously pledge to work with lawmakers to prevent future disasters. And Step Four: Quietly unleash your pack of lobbyists to

gut any effective change in the law. Norfolk honchos are now pushing hard on Step Four. CEO Alan Shaw recently reiterated the corporation's promise of reform, but - shhhh - he quietly orchestrated a \$17 million increase in the rail industry's Congressional lobbying to kill or drastically weaken safety proposals that Norfolk had publicly embraced after the wreck.

But he keeps talking reform, slyly assuring locals that Norfolk Southern would be "continuing our engagement" with lawmakers.

"Engagement" is a euphemism for payments. Rail executives have poured beaucoup bucks into such compliant Congress critters as Troy Nehls, the Republican chair of a rail safety subcommittee. He recently wailed that Congress must not impose "more burdensome regulations and all this other stuff" on the poor multibillion-dollar

Also, Sen. John Thune, an industry-financed asset who formerly was a lobbyist for railroads(!), has tried to derail even modest safety proposals following last year's derailment, callously calling them a "stalking horse for onerous regulatory mandates and union giveaways." May I just say the obvious? These people are disgusting excuses for human beings.

The Detroit Produce Terminal HISTORY IN THE MAKING BUILDING MICHIGAN: The Detroit Produce Terminal BY Marty Mule



LEAFY GREENS, STRAWBERRIES, potatoes, you name it – fruits and vegetables grown locally and throughout North and South America are moved in and out of the Detroit Produce Terminal every day, and have been since 1929. More than three football fields long, the terminal's railroad company owner's architects used different-colored brick and vertical concrete pilasters fronting Fort Street to add some interest to the exterior, although backed-in trucks dominate the view.

Since 1929, the Detroit Produce Terminal hasn't changed its footprint much, nor has it changed its mission.

Fresh fruits and vegetables arrive daily from Michigan and across the U.S. and other countries in the Western Hemisphere. They're organized for shipment, and then exit via trucks for distribution to regional and far-flung restaurants, food service companies and grocery stores.

The bi-level produce terminal, at Fort and Green streets in Southwest Detroit, is a fixture in the area for the ever-present trucks backed into loading bays visible from Fort Street, as well as the iconic rooftop "Detroit Produce Terminal" sign that westbound drivers can't miss.

"Built by the Wabash, Pere Marquette and Pennsylvania Railroads, the Detroit Produce Terminal was constructed to give Detroit an efficient method of produce distribution. It took only 150 days to build the entire terminal," said Charles K. Hyde in The Lower Peninsula of Michigan, An Inventory of Historic Engineering and Industrial Sites.

At one time railroads delivered much of the product that arrived at the terminal, but their presence steadily declined over the years. There is still a rail spur into the facility that allows for incoming fruits and vegetables, but most of the goods these days are moved via trucks.

According to industry newsletter *Produce Business*, today the 168,000-square-foot facility is home to seven produce companies. The terminal's tenants formed a market collective in the 1990s, with a property management firm taking control in 2003.

"With rare exception, every vegetable or piece of fruit bought from an independent grocer or gourmet market in southeast Michigan or southern Ontario since 1929 has passed through the stalls in the terminal's historic buildings," said *DBusiness*.

In 1929, the new terminal replaced a completely inadequate method of fruit and vegetable distribution system for the city – produce sales were made directly from rail cars at various yards in the city. Fruit and vegetable buyers would appear at railway yards at 2 a.m. and rail agents would try to direct them to where cars were spotted at various locations. Spoilage and inefficiency were rampant. So the railways decided that the growing city deserved a centralized place to receive and distribute fruits and vegetables, and they underwrote construction of the **Detroit Produce Terminal with** a \$5 million investment.

"Actual construction of the new terminal followed a most extensive study and survey of

other produce terminals in the country, and no expense was spared in construction to make the Detroit facilities meet the problems of the produce trade in that city," said a December 1929 article in Railway Age. "As a result, the new facilities are not only modern in every respect, but incorporate a number of unusual features in both construction and operation." The trio of railway companies established the Green Real Estate Co. to build the terminal on a 40-acre site near their rail lines.

Engineering and design plans were commenced on Jan. 15, 1929. Construction began on Feb. 21, and "by July 1, the regular routine of the terminal was in full operation with many of the facilities taxed to the utmost," said *Railway Age*. Several more weeks of work created the onsite banana building to handle the yellow fruit.

Hyde's Inventory of Historic Engineering and Industrial Sites said the main Building A is a two-story reinforced concrete structure with dimensions of 1,040 feet by 70 feet. "The first floor is a flat slab type while the second floor and roofs are of the beam and girder design. The top floor is composed of offices and auction floors while the bottom floors are for display purposes." The bottom floor, with the bulk delivery platforms, have a series of 14- by 8-foot doors that open straight up to accomodate trucks.

Railway Age said the complex was unique in the nation because it included modern second-floor office space for produce dealers, and the auction space. And the terminal's extensive frontage on Fort Street, the publication said, "demanded that the exterior of the building be attractive in appearance."

"The principal architectural problem involved was the choice of a treatment which would avoid a squatty appearance in two-story buildings of

"In solving this problem, iron spot buff bricks with a range of color were used in panels between concrete pilasters, with ornamental tapered finials extending above the parapets. In addition, the vertical lines were exaggerated as much as possible, with pleasing results as to the proportions of the buildings."

Inside, granite chips were spread into the setting concrete floors to increase their wearability. Considerable plans were made for the interior layout so that traffic would flow freely. With rail cars first refrigerated by ice blocks, the facility had an extensive ice distribution system. Floors were pitched to drain melting ice to the building's center drain system.

Auctions for bulk buyers of fruits and vegetables took place early in the morning, and house rules dictated that all produce placed on terminal floors must be sold by 3 p.m., guaranteeing freshness and clearing the way for the next day's sales. More than 50,000 railcar loads of goods were handled in the produce terminal's first year.

The Wabash Railway, a participating owner, on June 27, 1929, called it "a remarkable facility. Detroit is to be congratulated for its enterprise and ingenuity in erecting the plant.... The fruit and vegetable industry is to be congratulated on having in America's fourth city a Union Terminal which surpasses every kindred venture in the United States."

Today some of the produce terminal tenants include Ben B. Schwartz & Sons, Rocky's Produce and Leonardo's Produce. The fruits and vegetables that move through the building run the gamut. Schwartz alone sources produce from more than 300 growers, distributing more than 12 million pounds annually, according to *The Packer*, an industry newsletter. Their distribution reaches as far south as Georgia and Texas, and as far east as New Hampshire.

"Demand in the Michigan region continues to be strong, especially with a lot of local, independent retailers and enough market share for retailers at both the national and local levels to thrive," *The Packer* said.

Detroit is well-positioned for the produce terminal. "The demand for quality and value is as high as any market in the country," said Riggio Distribution President Dominic Riggio to *Produce Business* in December. "Geographically, Detroit benefits from local sources in-season, in conjunction with shipped-in product year-round."

With fragile majority, trades urge Dems to finish the job for labor

Lansing Democrats adopted a whopping 300-plus pieces of legislation into law last year, many of them pro-labor, many of them overturning statewide laws and regulations pushed through by big-business-backed Republican lawmakers over the years.

But with such thin majorities, especially in the House, the legislative agenda being pushed by organized labor slowed significantly in the waning months of 2023 – and left undone were a number of major and minor issues of importance to the state's working people.

And lawmaking essentially came to a full stop in November, when Dems temporarily lost the majority when two House members ran, and won, mayoral positions in their hometowns of Warren and Westland. A 54-54 tie is now in place between Democrats and Republicans. Special elections scheduled for April 16 to fill those House vacancies are expected to restore the Democratic House majority in Lansing.

"So at the end of 2023 we were able to send over 300 bills to the governor's desk for her signature," said House Speaker Joe Tate (D-Detroit) to the delegates. "And that was the first time that that happened since 2011. We wanted to show that we were governing. Everyone knows the big-ticket items that we were really focused on. Repealing right to work, reinstituting prevailing wage. Expanding EITC (the Earned Income Tax Credit), repealing the pension tax and putting in a budget that supports training and education and our labor friends.

"At the end of the day, teams win. But sometimes it gets kind of messy over there (at the state Capitol) because of the margin of people we do have. But us being able to stay focused on teams winning, we have been able to accomplish a lot, and we're going to continue that."

The administration of GOP Gov. Rick Snyder (2011-2018) infamously signed the Republican bills to institute a right-towork law in Michigan and to repeal the Prevailing Wage Act of 1965. But they also signed legislation that made Michigan the first state in the nation to reduce Unemployment Compensation benefits from 26 weeks to 20 weeks. They also adopted legislation severely limiting employee access to Workers' Compensation benefits. Reversing all of that, and more, are on the to-do list for organized labor in Michigan.

Most voters are aware of what happened to the Michigan Legislature following the state-wide elections in November 2022. Voters elected a razor thin 56-54 majority of Democrats in the House, then elected Dems to a similarly tiny 20-18 edge in the Senate. Together with Gov. Gretchen Whitmer, Dems since January 2023 have held a controlling "trifecta" of state government for the first time in 40 years.

"In Michigan, for many years, the deck has been stacked against unions and working people," state Sen. John Cherry (D-Flint) told delegates. "In this past year, we have spent some time trying to unstack that deck. Repealing the right to work law, restoring the prevailing wage law, restoring collective bargaining rights for public sector unions.

"And I'm happy we were able to deliver on those. But there's more work we need to do. Start working on some things that go directly to a worker's life. Like making sure we have an unemployment system that serves as a meaningful and relevant safety net for folks when they get laid off. Like making sure we have a workers' comp system that

actually helps somebody, or God forbid, the family, of someone who has been hurt or killed while working on the job.

"We need to make sure that we bring better working conditions for people, whether that means making sure we go after wage theft, making sure we have proper enforcement of MIOSHA regulations, or cracking down on child labor. These are things that we need to do this year."

Lieutenant Gov. Garlin Gilchrist put it this way: "Now that we have at least taken out a good portion of the trash, now we have to build for the future."

State Rep. Jim Haadsma (D-Battle Creek), who chairs the House Labor Committee, explained why more pro-labor legislation didn't move last year. He said the thin majority means that one or two reluctant lawmakers among the Dems can quash any legislation. "It's not from my perspective a very manageable majority," Haadsma told delegates. "We need a couple more members because the tail wags the dog sometimes. We have a back-bencher of the 56 and it's not always the same one, who says I don't think I can vote for this."

Haadsma said count him in on reforming the Michigan Workers Compensation Disability Act, which he said was "changed very negatively toward Michigan workers back in 2011." He also said he's on board with

restoring the benefit weeks for jobless compensation from 20 weeks back to 26 weeks, and upping the benefit amount. Republican lawmakers during the Snyder Administration, he said, "acted boldly and managed to do a whole lot of stuff that was deleterious to workers. My objective is to get much of that repealed."

The good news for organized labor is that while those thin majorities in the House and Senate offer no guarantees, the passage of that pro-worker legislation has many supporters – and perhaps the needed unanimity among Dems.

Several speakers at the conference noted that with 2024 being an election year, and with the delay in utilizing their majority this year, time will be short for Dems in getting legislation adopted.

"You should feel as though organized labor is welcome into the house of power in ways that it hasn't before," said State Rep. Sarah Anthony (D-Lansing). "My door is always open, and our members, especially on the Democratic side, have a mandate from leadership to take your issues seriously. It is a new day in the halls of power in Michigan, and you should know that and feel that.

"You are in a position to demand, in this moment in time, what you feel is important to your members. Those of us who are elected on the state level, and the local and federal level, need to take your concerns seriously."

attorney who worked as general counsel to IBEW Local 876.

Egan is probably the highest-ranking union member in Whitmer's government, and certainly, is its biggest advocate for organized labor. But he wasn't shy about telling delegates that the Whitmer Administration and state lawmakers need to do more for workers in Michigan after decades of benign neglect, and prevailing wage enforcement is just the start.

"We're continuing to fight for working people," Egan said. "One of the things I'm most proud of is in the labor areas I oversee, MIO-SHA, Workers' Comp, Wage and Hour, and the Bureau of Employment Relations, is bringing a worker-first mentality to our department. And I have to tell you, that's not shared across the State of Michigan, either administratively, or in our departments, all of the time.

"So what a pro-worker mindset means, is that we think about workers first. But what I deal with all the time is a pro-business mentality, let's think about business first, and if workers get something, I guess that's OK. Is that good enough for us? That's not good enough for me. I think a strong regulatory structure is important. Do you think it's important for workplaces to be safe, fair, to take care of you if you're injured, to provide unemployment benefits if you're laid off? That seems like pretty basic stuff to me. I don't know what's so god-damp hard?"

Democrats in the state House lost two members – and their thin 56-54 majority – last November when two of their caucus won mayoral elections in Warren and Westland. With special elections in April expected to restore the Dem majority in the House, the state's labor unions are sharpening their demands for passage of more proworker legislative actions.

Two of the items at the top of labor's list are restoring Unemployment Compensation benefit weeks and rescinding laws that restricted Workers Compensation benefits.

But Egan, while supporting those greater worker benefits, said the state has existing deficiencies in policing and administering current labor laws. "First and foremost," he said, "we need a bigger and better Department of Labor. We want a Department of Labor that's going to push issues and push a real pro-worker agenda across the State of Michigan."

To illustrate his point, some numbers, according to Egan:

•In the Wage and Hour Division, the state has one investigator for every 290,000 workers in Michigan. "So we just got prevailing wage restored; we did not get extra people," to enforce it, Egan said. A request for 27 more employees went unheeded by the state, which would have brought that investigator ratio down to about one in 150,000 workers. "Most of the other states that we look at that we like, that aren't Mississippi, are around one in 100,000 workers," Egan said. "Guess what's in the recommended budget: zero."

•Similarly, 43 more personnel were requested for MIOSHA, then that was pared down to 24. But, again, the current state budget has no money for increased personnel.

•The DOL requested a new program, focused on workplace mental health, which would require extra personnel. Again, zero money has been budgeted so far.

In total for the above requests, Egan said, "that's about \$14 million annually we've asked for. Does that sound like a lot in a budget of \$82 billion? No? Doesn't sound like a lot to me, either. But we got goose eggs all across the board."

"Why is it so difficult to understand that when we win, everybody wins?" Egan said. "I'll keep pushing, you keep pushing, and we'll keep coming back to these (conferences) and commiserating about all the b.s. we have to deal with because people are too chickens---to stand up for working people and be loud and proud about union membership and why it's so important."



DUES PAYMENTS: YOUR DUES PAYMENTS ARE DUE PRIOR TO THE FIRST OF THE MONTH. The books will close at the end of the business day on the last day of the month. Payments made on the 1st of the month are considered late for that month. There will be no exception, once the books are closed it cannot be **undone.** Members will receive a text message dues reminder prior to the end of the month. BENEFICIARY REMINDER: Please remember to designate or update your beneficiary choice on all of your Local 80 and international benefits. The law requires that in the event of an untimely death your benefits go to your spouse first and if there is no spouse to your children UNLESS you designate otherwise in writing with each specific benefit. Depending on your classification you could have benefits due to your heirs from Local 80 pension, insurance, annuity and from international and SASMI. ACCIDENTAL DEATH and DISMEMBERMENT IN-SURANCE FROM OUR INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION: Members who have their dues paid in advance (prior to the month of the accident) are eligible for accidental death and dismemberment benefits up to \$7,500.00. This benefit comes as a dues paying member of SMART International.

WEEKEND WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Saturday and Sunday work assignments. Please remember that when performing work on a Saturday or Sunday the steward must report it to the hall, give each members name and obtain a form for signatures. Each member must sign the form along with the number of hours they worked. The completed form must be sent back to by hall by the end of the day on the following Monday. Weekend work assignments must be called or emailed into the hall prior to 3:00 pm on Friday.

WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Everyone must obtain a work assignment prior to starting work. If you fail to do so you could be written up on charges.

LAY-OFFS: All members must report to the Union Hall immediately upon lay-off, even if you only work one day. These are the By-Law rules for the Out-of-Work List. Your name will be removed from the list fourteen (14) days after receiving an assignment. It is very important to report to the union hall immediately after your layoff. Members get confused because the S.U.B. Fund allows you a period of up to seven (7) days to apply for S.U.B. benefits after lay-off.

LAY-OFF SLIPS/TERMINATION NOTICES: Lay off slips must accompany all applications for sub pay. Without lay off slips you cannot collect sub pay. It is the member's responsibility to make sure they get one from the contractor when laid off. Your application cannot be submitted without one. It is the contractor's responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven (7) days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive SUB benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register bi-annually: March 1 through March 20 and September 1 through September 20. If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

SHORT WORK WEEK SUB PAY: If you work 16 hours or less in a week or have a short work week due to weather you may (Continued on Page 5)



Breakthrough, maybe, for Starbucks' approach to union organizers

SEATTLE (PAI) - Starbucks, the monster coffee chain that has steadfastly refused to bargain with itsunionizing workers unless it's behind closed doors and shop by shop, has agreed to bargain about bargaining with all of them as a group, in so many words.

The agreement was announced jointly by the firm and Starbucks Workers United – the Service Employees affiliate whose workers are helping the from-the-ground-up Star-bucks workers organizing.

After two years and no talks between the workers at the 400 Starbucks stores that voted to go union, plus SWU, on one side and Howard Schultz and the other bosses at Starbucks on the other, SWU and the workers hailed the agreement to talk.

If the firm negotiates, it'll have to discuss demands of some 9,000 workers at 400 Starbucks stores nationwide who voted to go union. That's a big "if." Store #400, in Miami, voted on March 7 to unionize. Agreeing to bargain about bargaining could be viewed as yet another Starbucks stall.

The firm refused to bargain with them as a group and refused to bargain with them because SWU and the worker reps invited other workers to Zoom in. Starbucks didn't want the others to see its intransigence. In the only two sessions under that format, Starbucks, led by its union-busting lawyers, walked out after five

"A giant step forward made possible by thousands and thousands of us joining together and speaking out... THIS IS HUGE," SWU began its tweets announcing the agreement to bargain about bargaining. As a result of our courage and persistence over the last 2 years, SBWU & Starbucks are in talks to build a foundational framework toward contract bargaining and organizing. 



Detroit, Ann Arbor and Lansing are currently having many calls getting into Book II if you are looking for work. Please contact the hall if you would like to sign any books.





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

You and your health . . .



A RECENTLY PUBLISHED study in the medical journal JAMA Open Network analyzed the cost of employer-sponsored health insurance in the U.S. It concluded that had health insurance costs remained stable, wages for the average family could have increased by nearly \$9,000 a year.

That's a big chunk of change. And lower-paid workers had an even larger percentage of their compensation eaten-up by health insurance costs, so they would have gained even more.

Simply put, Dr. Dariush Mozaffarian, a cardiologist and senior author on the study, said in a news release that "Employers are spending more on insurance premiums instead of that money going to workers as wages."

The study compiled national insurance data from individuals with employer sponsored health insurance from 1988 through 2019. In 1988, health insurance premiums averaged 7.9% of total worker compensation. By 2019, the percentage has risen to 17.7%.

If costs had not jumped so high, \$8,774 more would have been available to put toward annual wages.

The Future Outlook

According to consulting firms Aon, Mercer, and Willis Towers Watson (WTA), healthcare cost increases ranging between 5.4% to 8.5% are expected in 2024. Typical annual increases have hovered in the 3-4% range in past years, according to Mercer. But 2023 costs were already 7% higher than in 2022, so an additional big hike this year will make it especially difficult to rein in costs.

Health insurance plans are expensive. Workers typically foot some of the bill for their plan

which can amount to thousands of dollars a year in out-of-pocket expenses. Increasingly, workers are struggling to afford their share of premiums, copays and deductibles. Often this leads to going without insurance, needed care, or amassing debt.

In a survey conducted by the Commonwealth Fund, 3,032 individuals who had employer-sponsored healthcare in 2023 answered a series of questions about their healthcare finances. 43% reported it was very or somewhat difficult to afford their healthcare. 30% were paying off debt from medical or dental care. 29% said their healthcare costs had made it harder for them to afford food or pay for common household expenses such as electric or heating bills.

What's Driving Costs?

People who put off care during the pandemic are now seeking care, and sometimes the chronic conditions they delayed getting care for will cost more to treat. Additionally, newer and more expensive specialty drugs, particularly for treating cancer, rheumatoid arthritis, MS, cystic fibrosis, and diabetes are being utilized in greater numbers, which increases the overall cost for prescription drugs.

While inflation is currently tame relative to the highs experienced in 2022-23, contracts between insurers and providers are often negotiated years in advance. New contracts will likely reflect an effort by providers to recover increased costs incurred

during the inflation upswing.

What Should Change?

The study in JAMA Open Network doesn't assign blame to any party, and instead points to the importance of changing U.S. health policy to focus on prevention and lower costs. Indeed, healthcare as it exists in the U.S. today is terribly complex, and many different parties are responsible for a


share of this high-cost system.

An article in the International Journal of Health Economics Management cites data that 98% of union workers have health insurance coverage, compared to 86% of those without a union. The same article quantified that union workers pay a lower share of out-of-pocket expenses, and that they are more likely to have a regular doctor.

Outdoors Stopping the invaders



(From the Michigan DNR) Protecting Michigan's 20 million acres of forest land and urban trees from threats posed by invasive plants, diseases and pests is no small job.

Some of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' recent work on that front is detailed in the latest "Forest Health Highlights" report, which explores forest health trends in the state during 2023.

As we mark National Invasive Species Awareness Week an annual event, this year which took place Feb. 26 through March 3, to bring attention to invasive species, the threats they pose and what we can do together to prevent their spread – it's a great time to look at what the DNR and others are doing to keep Michigan's forests healthy, productive and sustainable in the face of this these risks.

An invasive species is one that is not native and whose introduction causes harm, or is likely to cause harm to Michigan's economy, environment, or human health. These pests often are fastgrowing, reproduce rapidly and have few predators or natural controls in their new environments.

'One of the biggest challenges to maintaining healthy forests is addressing pests and diseases," Sue Tangora, forest health and cooperative programs manager for the DNR's Forest Resources Division, said in the report's introduction.

Tangora went on to explain that climate change is altering forest pest and disease outbreaks – which historically were predictable, as forests evolved with native insects and diseases, adapting to maintain forest benefits - and creating new challenges for forest managers. Climate change creates uncertainty about the extent, timing and severity of outbreaks.

"This unpredictability increases with every new invasive insect, disease or plant introduced into our forests. The longer invasives are at play, the harder it is to

reverse the negative impacts they have on forests and the people and wildlife who depend on them," she said.

Examples of 2023 invasive species efforts highlighted in the report include teaming up with local and federal partners to treat hemlock trees in six west Michigan counties against a tiny, aphid-like invader, the hemlock woolly adelgid, and working to identify and respond to detections of beech leaf disease in seven southeast Michigan counties.

"The DNR's forest health team works closely with local cooperative invasive species management areas, or CISMAs, federal experts, researchers and many others to address issues that are new or ongoing," said James Wieferich, forest health unit manager with the DNR's Forest Resources Division. "Besides on-the-ground work, the Forest Health Program brings money into Michigan to help partners address forest health challenges and concerns across the state and, in many cases,

prevent rapid spread of new pests and diseases into the region."

Progress is being made against the pest. The battle against the hemlock woolly adelgid is one good example of the type of teamwork that takes place when Michigan's forests are threatened. The tiny insect sucks sap from hemlock twigs, and ongoing infestations can weaken or kill host trees.

That threat means boots on the ground, first to find infestations, then to treat the trees. Over the past seven years, 12,468 acres and 231,429 trees have been treated as part of a strategy to keep the insect from spreading into northern forests. The good news: Most of Michigan's hemlock trees are many miles away from established hemlock woolly adelgid populations.

Over the past seven years, more than \$6.5 million has been raised to respond to the threat posed by the insect, and efforts continue to be funded through the Michigan Invasive Species Grant Program, Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, U.S. Environmental

Protection Agency, Recreation Passport (state park user fees), fundraising efforts supported by Bob Ross Inc. and other state funds.

The DNR's forest health team also works with the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development to respond to recent detections of a similar insect, the balsam woolly adelgid, in Kent, Missaukee and Oceana counties.

Balsam woolly adelgid also

woolly adelgid poses a threat to email MDA-Info@Michigan.gov. the roughly 1.9 billion balsam fir trees within their native range in Michigan's northern Lower and Upper peninsulas, as well as nonnative Fraser and concolor firs. These fir species are important to Michigan's Christmas tree industry. Producing nearly 13.5 million trees each year, Michigan is the country's third-largest Christmas tree grower.

Balsam woolly adelgid was detected in Michigan in August 2021, when MDARD officials were notified of several infested Fraser firs in Kent County. No evidence of additional infestation was found within the survey area, and the eight infested Frasier firs were cut and chipped in winter 2021. Follow-up surveys in late 2022 found no evidence of balsam woolly adelgid in Kent County.

However, in 2023, additional infestations likely resulting from separate introductions were detected in limited areas of Missaukee and Oceana counties. Infestations are currently being evaluated, and treatment plans will be implemented once completed.

You can help. Forest health professionals cover a lot of ground throughout the state, but they can't be everywhere. The program relies heavily on reports from people who notice unusual insects or sick or dying trees. If you see something unusual or have concerns about trees in your area, use one of these methods to

"Our department works tirelessly to prevent the spread of these pests, but getting everyone involved in prevention and detection is key to the fight against invasive species," said Steve Carlson, MDARD's Pesticide and Plant Pest Management Division director.

MDARD's suggestions for some ways to help limit the spread of invasive species in-

 Buy heat-treated firewood or buy wood where you burn it to avoid transporting insects or tree diseases that may be hitchhiking in untreated wood.

•When returning from international travel, declare food, plants and other agricultural items to U.S. Customs and Border Protection to ensure these items are pest-free.

 Avoid buying seeds or plants online from unknown vendors.

•After enjoying the outdoors, inspect and clean shoes, clothing, gear and vehicles to assure they are pest- and seed-free.


