Work zone cameras may slow speeders

With little to deter motorists from zipping past Michigan's highway construction zones in excess of posted speed limits, there is legislation in place that would allow the placement of automated cameras in work zones to catch speeders.

HB 5750 was passed out of the state House Judiciary Committee in May and awaits action on the House floor. Sponsored by State Rep. Sara Cambensy (D-Marquette), the work zone would need a sign informing drivers that their speed is being monitored, as well as the penalties for surpassing the posted speed by 10 mph or more. Those penalties could range from a written warning to a \$300 civil fine for repeat violations.

"We are not looking to raise money. We are not looking to create a system where we are speed-trapping drivers. Simply, we want them to slow down," Cambensy testified.

First-time offenders would receive a written warning in the mail. Repeat offenders with violations within three years would face fines up to \$150. Subsequent offenses would result in fines up to \$300.

On board with the idea: Operating Engineers Local 324, and no doubt other labor unions. During a Michigan Department of Transportation podcast on Aug. 10, Local 324 Training Director John Osika pointed out that he worked 30 years in the field, 25 of them as a foreman and superintendent on road and bridge projects.

"Think about it – the speed limit when I started was 55 miles an hour on the freeway. And now look what it is, I mean it's still 60 in the work zones," Osika said. "I've seen some things things that I don't even want to talk about.

"We just have to do something about it because we want everybody to go home every night. I think anything we can do will make a dent. I think with these tickets, you kind of hit them where it counts."

According to the news service MIRS, the legislation would establish an automated speed enforcement system within the Michigan State Police, which would be responsible for sending the House and Senate transportation committees a report within five years of the bill being implemented. It would consist of the number of citations distributed, and a layout of the expenses and revenue generated

from the sensors. "One of the benefits that this automated work zone enforcement brings to us is that other states have shown that we can count on a reduction of work zone crashes by roughly half. That obviously provides safety to the individuals that are working in our work zones, but also the motorists, as well," said MDOT Construction Operations Engi neer Lindsey Renner.





Union leaders cheer passage of \$739B 'inflation reduction' bill

Prevailing wage provisions are particularly pleasing

WASHINGTON, D.C. (PAI) -It was a far cry from wha President Joe Biden, the nation's unions and other progressives originally sought, and it included late giveaways to Big Pharma, Wall Street and the fossil fuel industry, but the \$739 billion Inflation Reduction Act was narrowly adopted in the House and Senate the week of Aug. 7.

President Biden signed the measure into law on Aug. 16.

The measure features – as positives - the largest-ever U.S. financial commitment to fighting climate change and a three-year extension of Affordable Care Act health insurance subsidies for the poor and near-poor. Bowing to a key Democratic senator, Joe Manchin, it plans to cut the deficit by \$300 billion over a decade.

It also imposes a 15 percent minimum tax on billion-dollar corporations and a 1 percent tax on corporate stock buybacks that actually will raise almost \$60 billion more than the pro-Wall Street provision that levy replaced.

And the bill lets Medicare

get started on bargaining down prescription drug prices with Big Pharma, although the impact of such talks would not be felt for several years.

Laborers President Terry O'Sullivan pointed out the \$369 billion in clean and green energy sections of the bill will provide "good union jobs" working under Davis-Bacon Act prevailing wages - and that they'll cover all energy sources from nuclear, to wind, to solar, to coal, to hydro, to renewables, to energy storage. It's "medicine working families need," O'Sullivan said.

AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler said the legislation "will transform the lives of working families at every level. This bill will reshape the future and deliver real help to working families by reducing rising energy and health care costs.

"Enacting clean energy tax incentives with labor standards and domestic content requirements will create good-paying jobs in construction and manufacturing right here in America. And this legislation will address long overdue changes to our tax system that will finally make the most profitable corporations pay their fair share.

Jobs numbers are back from pre-pandemic levels

WASHINGTON, D.C. (PAI)-The big news in the employment data for July can be summed up in one phrase: Jobs are all the way back from the coronaviruscaused crash.

And the economy's job numbers recovered quickly, compared to other recessions. That's even though this drop starting in March 2020 was so steep, with official joblessness in the midteens percentage-wise and with more than one-fifth of the country collecting unemployment (Continued on Page 5) | checks at its depths, that it arguable became a brief depression.

A strong surge of 528,000 jobs added last month helped lead the BLS to report that 5.67 million people were jobless in July, 242,000 fewer than in June. In February 2020, the last full month before the crash hit, 5.71 million people were unemployed, which jumped to 7.16 million a month later in March, and then about tripled to 23.04 million people out of work in April 2020.

There was one big negative note: The next week, BLS reported inflation was running at an 8.5 percent annual rate through July, even while in this jobs report, average weekly earnings rose at 4.6 percent.

However, wage growth is slowing down. Economic Policy Institute Senior Analyst Elise Gould said: "The latest quarterly change shows an increase in July, but it may be a blip in an otherwise downward trend and is almost surely still pulling down, not

Let's trim fat corporations

How corporations are using inflation to take your money... Inflation is a cover that corporations are using to squeeze more money out of you. But as I'll explain, there are five things we can do to fight back.

Corporations are using inflation as an excuse to raise their prices, hurting workers and consumers while they enjoy record

Prices are surging – but let's be clear: corporations are not raising prices simply because of the increasing costs of supplies and labor. They could easily absorb these higher costs, but instead they are passing them on to consumers and even raising prices higher than those cost increases.

Corporations are getting away with this because they face little or no competition.

If markets were competitive, companies would keep their prices down to prevent competitors from grabbing away customers. But in a market with only a few competitors able to coordinate prices, consumers have no real choice.

As a result, corporations are raking in their highest profits in 70 years. Are they using these record profits to raise their workers' real wages? No. They're handing out meager wage increases to attract or keep workers with one hand, but effectively eliminating those wage increases by raising prices with the other.

Wages grew 5.6 percent over the past year – but prices rose 8.5 percent. That means, adjusted for inflation, workers actually got a 2.9 percent pay cut.

So what are corporations doing with their record profits? Using them to boost share prices by buying back a record amount of their own shares of stock. Goldman Sachs expects buybacks to reach \$1 trillion this year – an all-time high.

This amounts to a direct upward transfer of wealth from average working people's wallets into CEOs' and shareholders' pock-

Just look: billionaires have become at least \$1.7 trillion richer during the pandemic, while CEO pay (based largely on stock values) is now at a record 350 times the typical worker's pay.

The Federal Reserve wants to curb inflation by continuing to raise interest rates. That would be a grave mistake, because it doesn't address corporate concentration and it will slow job and wage growth. The labor market isn't "unhealthily tight," as Fed Chair Jerome Powell claims. Corporations are unhealthily fat.

So what's the real solution?

First, tougher antitrust enforcement to address the growing concentration of the economy into the hands of a few giant corporations. Since the 1980s, over two-thirds of American industries have become more concentrated, enabling corporations to coordinate price increases.

Next, a temporary windfall profits tax that takes corporation's record profits and redistributes them as direct payments to everyday Americans struggling to cover soaring prices.

Third, a ban on corporate stock buybacks. Buybacks were illegal before Ronald Reagan's SEC legalized them in 1982 – and they should be made illegal again.

Fourth, higher taxes on the wealthy and on corporations. Corporate tax rates are at near-record lows, even as corporate profits are at a near-record highs. And much of billionaires' pandemic gains have escaped taxes altogether.

Lastly, stronger unions. As corporate power has grown, union membership has declined, and economic inequality has risen the reason most workers haven't seen a real raise in 40 years. All workers deserve the right to collectively bargain for higher wages

In short, the real problem is not inflation. The real problem is the increase in corporate power and the decline in worker power over the past 40 years.

Unless we address this growing imbalance, corporations will continue siphoning off the economy's gains into their CEOs' and shareholders' pockets – while everyday Americans get shafted.

Amazingly, this existential, truly-revolutionary question is one that millions of hard-working people throughout our topdown corporate system are asking themselves, their families, and friends. Why are we working like this, why does it matter, what else is there?

Airline pilots, for example, "Work your fingers to the have stunned the industry by prioritizing non-monetary demands in their current contract negotiations with the Big Four monopolistic airline giants. The bosses have offered 14 percent pay hikes, but pilots are demanding something more meaningful: Structural changes to improve their quality of life. They're routinely frustrated by management's inept scheduling, inadequate staffing, and onerous work rules that leave them stressed out, dangerously fatigued, and often stranded far from home.

The bottom line is not to get another dollar, but being able to plan and enjoy a non-work life. "You absolutely cannot address quality of life with money," says the president of the pilots' union at Southwest Airlines. "You're never going to pay someone enough for a lost piano recital with their daughter or a lost baseball game."

There are many compromises required to make a living these days, but we humans are finally beginning to say: Enough - you can buy my hard work, but not my life.

history, before touring it. There's also new room for meeting space that was lacking in building's existing footprint.

Michigan Capitol Facilities Assistant Director of Facility Operations & Event Coordinator Barb Thumudo said the addition had a "soft opening" on July 5, but some tradespeople have remained on site through August to do touch-up work and other

"We love the new space," Thumudo said. "We have received nothing but positive feedback, not only from visitors, but from other state agencies who want to use the space for meetings." She said the first large group visited in July – the University of Michigan football team and its entourage enjoyed lunch and a tour of the building during a trip around the state.

The new space has been sought for years by Michigan Capitol staff, as a way to help preserve the historic building.

"When Michigan's current Capitol opened in 1879," says Michigan State Capitol's Capitol Infrastructure Upgrade Report, "no one anticipated how government, citizen engagement, and the state's population would grow. Today the Capitol welcomes 250,000 annual visitors who attend legislative sessions, take tours, and participate in everything from farmers markets to concerts, commemorations, advocacy days, and demonstrations.

"These activities place significant stress on the... building's fragile historic fabric and decorative art. Heritage Hall will reduce much of the pressure placed on the Capitol and will provide space for large meetings and events.'

Thumudo says the Capitol hosts about 15 tours a day during the school year. Now, the visitors coming in the new entrance from the new driveway off Ottawa Street are led into one of two orientation rooms, their walls decorated with graphics of how government works and how a bill becomes a law. From there they are led down a ramp wall leading to the Capitol's interior with terrific graphics and artifacts depicting historic people, photos and events related to the building itself and state government. The entire space is in a bright atrium under a series of skylights.

"Christman, the contractors and the tradespeople have been great to work with, and they've done some great work," Thumudo said. "We have a great relationship with Christman, we have seen them and the workers here for years and they feel like

"Strong demand for construction is being offset by rising materials prices and labor shortages," said Stephen E. Sandherr, the AGC's chief executive officer. "As firms stretch schedules and boost costs to cover rising materials prices it is getting harder for public and private owners to proceed with some planned projects."

In fact, material prices aren't "rising," according to Sanherr's own AGC, which reported on Aug. 11 that the price of materials and services used in nonresidential construction fell 1.3 percent in July. Although, that may have been offset by contractors'

Building Michigan: The Tilden Mine **HISTORY IN THE MAKING**


CLEVELAND CLIFFS OWNS some 21,100 acres of surface rights for the Tilden Mine in Marquette County. The open pit iron ore mine began production in its present set-up in 1974. It is a massive scarring of the land from an environmental standpoint, but it has provided thousands of union jobs over the years, and it has fed made-in-America steel to auto plants and other industries. Cleveland Cliffs

Nothing like the presence of some world-class iron ore deposits... to alter the course of American history?

In the 1800s, the decadeslong, gradual ramping up of the mining of iron ore from various lodes in the Upper Peninsula and Minnesota was vital to the industrialization of the United States.

A paper by the Central Upper Peninsula and Northern **Michigan University Archives** said the historical contribution of iron ore to the nation's development has "received much less attention" than it deserves. "Yet the iron mines of Lake Superior were of central importance to the evolution of America's iron and steel industry," the paper said.

The Economist said "the development of a process to turn raw earth into steel merits a high spot on a list of mankind's most ingenious achievements. The metal provides the backbone of skyscrapers, bridges and motorways, and the carapace and internal organs of cars, fridges and washing machines. Given steel's ubiquity – it makes up 95 percent of global metal production – iron ore, the raw material

from which it is made, attracts strangely little attention."

Even more adamant is the Michigan Mineral Producers Geological Survey Edition (1975): "From about 1760 to the mid-1800s the United States had limited supplies of high-grade iron ore deposits," the publication said. "However, too often the demand outstripped the supply, and hence America seemed destined to an economy centered on agricultural products. The discovery of the great iron ore deposits in the Lake Superior Region was undoubtedly the greatest single factor in shaping the century which followed."

Today, Michigan's lone contributor to the nation's iron ore supplies comes from the Tilden Mine, located about five miles south of Ishpeming in Marquette County. The open pit site contains a belt of ore approximately two miles long and a half mile wide. Owner Cleveland-Cliffs mined this ore by open pit methods on a relatively small scale from 1927 through 1971.

Numerous other mines operated in the region over the past century, including the nearby

Empire Mine (closed in 2016) and the Mather B Mine in Negaunee (closed in 1979). Thirty years ago a Michigan Tech University team cataloged more than 2,000 shafts from 800 mines in Marquette County and seven other western U.P. counties over the years.

In 1972 the Tilden works – named for Samuel J. Tilden, a former Democratic presidential candidate and businessman who owned mining interests in the U.P. – were greatly expanded under Cliffs and a consortium of steel manufacturing companies.

At that time, "after 25 years of research," says a history prepared by the Mining Journal, 'Cleveland Cliffs developed a successful means of concentrating the low-grade Tilden ore. The new process upgrades Tilden ore to a pellet product containing 65 percent iron with 5 percent silica. In 1972, following years of planning and pre-engineering, construction began on the present facilities, and pellet production commenced in December 1974."

"In the first century of mining in Michigan's Upper Peninsula, high-grade ore was mined and shipped directly to the steel mills," says a geological history published by Michigan State University. "By the 1950s, highgrade reserves in North America were rapidly being depleted and the industry launched extensive research projects to find methods to utilize the low-grade reserves which were available in abundance.

"The ore being mined today was once considered worthless rock because there was no practical method to unlock the iron bearing material. If those methods had not been devised, North American steel mills would have been forced to look elsewhere in the world for this vital commodity."

A deep dive "Technical Report Summary" into its current operations at Tilden released on Feb. 7 by current owner Cleveland Cliffs contains a number of insights into the current operations of the mine.

At Tilden, the ore is mined from blasted ground with massive loaders and dump trucks, crushed, and sent to a processing plant. In the concentrating plant, more grinding creates an extremely fine concentrate. The iron mineral is liberated during this process, creating a highgrade concentrate. In a pelletiz-

ing plant, the concentrated ore is rolled into balls, and they're heat-hardened in large kilns at 2,400 degrees, creating finished iron ore pellets to be turned into steel.

The Tilden facility can mine either hematite ore (which has a higher iron content) or magnetite. It is the only mine in the nation that can proces both. To get at the ore, about half a ton of rock must be removed to gain access to hematitic ore, and about a ton of rock must be removed for every ton of magnetite ore.

The waste is stored approximately five miles southeast of the Tilden concentrator plant in two dike-type impoundments covering 2,450 acres.

The first trainload of pellets left the mine on Dec. 17, 1974, bound for the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad ore dock in Marquette. From the ore dock the pellets are dropped into lake freighters for distribution to Cliffs' steelmaking plants on the Great Lakes.

At those plants, the pellets are fired in a blast furnace to create molten iron. The molten iron is then used to make steel. The Tilden operation employs a total of 967 salaried and hourly employees as of the end of last year.

Over the decades thousands of U.P. building trades workers have had middle class lifestyles bolstered by incomes from working on construction and maintenance operations at the Tilden Mine. There is tremendous wear and tear on the equipment, where extracting a heavy metal like iron ore from the ground requires a symphony of heavymetal machinery.

In 2021, iron ranges in

Minnesota and Michigan shipped 98 percent of the nation's usable iron ore products to support America's \$520 billion steel industry, with the Tilden Mine providing about 15 percent.

Today the Tilden Mine produces 4 million gross tons of high grade pellets every year, and the mine is expected to operate through the year 2050. That lines up very closely with the original 75-year estimate of the lifespan of the available ore.

Mine shutdowns and restarts have become a fact of life for the U.P. over the years. The most recent shutdown at the Tilden Mine took place in 2020, when it was idled for three months due to supply chain disruptions brought on by the pandemic.

Going forward, Cleveland Cliffs management said its mines – it owns or co-owns five operating iron ore mines in Michigan and Minnesota - are fairly well-positioned in an industry where there is always a threat from low-cost foreign imports, as well as economic downturns.

"The economic viability of Cliffs' iron ore reserves will in many cases be dictated by the pricing fundamentals for the steel it is generated for, as well as scrap and seaborne iron ore itself," the company said in February. "The importance of the steel industry in North America, and specifically the USA, is apparent by the actions of the U.S. federal government by implementing and keeping import restrictions in place. Cliffs expects the U.S. government to continue recognizing the importance of this industry and does not see major declines in the production of steel in North America."







The New York Tribune reported that: "The windows and roofs and even the lamp posts and awning frames were occupied by persons anxious to get a good view of the first parade in New York of workingmen of all trades united in one organization.'

At noon, the marchers arrived at Reservoir Park, the termination point of the parade. While some returned to work, most continued on to the post-parade party at Wendel's Elm Park at 92nd Street and Ninth Avenue; even some unions that had not participated in the parade showed up to join in the post-parade festivities that included speeches, a picnic, an abundance of cigars. and "Lager beer kegs... mounted in every conceivable place."

From 1 p.m. until 9 p.m. that night, nearly 25,000 union members and their families filled the park and celebrated the very first, and almost entirely disastrous, Labor Day.

Union leaders cheer passage of \$739B bill

will improve the lives of millions of Americans struggling to afford health care, seniors trying to pay for their prescriptions and future generations who will be able to see the impacts of drastically reduced The Inflation Reduction Act, technically a budget "reconcilia-

tion" bill, passed on a party-line vote. All 48 Democrats plus independents Bernie Sanders of Vermont and Angus King of Maine favored it. All 50 Republicans voted "no." Vice President Kamala Harris broke the tie. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., apparently overcame progressive grumbles there before the scheduled vote on the Other labor leaders lauded it. legislation. 'We applaud Congress for voting to uplift the middle class and

America's economy by passing the Inflation Reduction Act," said North America's Building Trades Unions President Sean McGarvey. "By taking strong action to lower the federal deficit, fight inflation, and provide historic labor protections in the largest investment to fight climate change and accelerate domestic energy production in our nation's history, this bill gives relief to all Americans.

"The Inflation Reduction Act places our country on a more secure and sustainable path, and opens more family-sustaining, middleclass career opportunities for millions of union and nonunion construction workers across the country."

The compromise between Senate Majority Leader Charles Schumer and reluctant West Virginian Sen. Manchin would "allow Medicare to negotiate the price of widely used prescription drugs" and "extend subsidies that lower Affordable Care Act premiums," the nation's largest union, the National Education Association, said in urging members to lobby the House for its passage. NEA too praised the clean energy sections and the corporate minimum tax.

In what senators call a Vote-A-Rama, lawmakers spent the weekend of Aug. 5-6 fending off Republican "poison pill" amendments that would have wrecked the deal.

Teamsters President Sean O'Brien cheered taxing the rich and corporations that don't pay anything. "Working people are sick of shouldering the burden of keeping America running since early 2020 while CEOs are counting their cash," he said. "This bill takes steps to reverse that while investing in good jobs and better health care to help families.'

The best salespeople for Unions are our members. I've been visiting job sites, speaking to non-union workers, doing house calls after hours, continuing Organizer training and taking part of Blitz's (multiple organizers/agents teaming up to cover more ground).

It's been very busy but rewarding when you can help families reap the rewards of Union labor. Our billboards are up! We have two, one is on I-96 right by our Hall and the other one is in Grand Rapids just before the S curve heading North on the West side of the highway. 



tional benefits. The law requires that in the event of an untimely death your benefits go to your spouse first and if there is no spouse to your children UNLESS you designate otherwise in writing with each specific benefit. Depending on your classification you could have benefits due to your heirs from Local 80 pension, insurance, annuity and from international and SASMI. Each individual benefit needs to have a designated beneficiary unless you want it to go to your spouse or children. As always seek the advice of an attorney.

ADDRESS CHANGES: If you have a new address please make sure to let the hall know. We will take care of your account with the union hall which includes the Tradesman paper. You will need to call Benesys at 800-400-7710 and update your address with them as well, that is not done through the hall.

WEEKEND WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Saturday and Sunday work assignments. Please remember that when performing work on a Saturday or Sunday the steward must report it to the hall, give each members name and obtain a form for signatures. Each member must sign the form along with the number of hours they worked. The completed form must be sent back to by hall by the end of the day on the following Monday. Weekend work assignments must be called or emailed into the hall prior to 3:00 pm on Friday.

WORKASSIGNMENTS: Everyone must obtain a work assignment prior to starting work. If you fail to do so you could be written up on charges.

LAY-OFFS: All members must report to the Union Hall immediately upon lay-off, even if you only work one day. These are the By-Law rules for the Out-of-Work List. Your name will be removed from the list 14 days after receiving an assignment. It is very important to report to the union hall immediately after your layoff. Members get confused because the S.U.B. Fund allows you a period of up to seven days to apply for S.U.B. benefits after lay-off.

LAY-OFF SLIPS/TERMINATION NOTICES: Lay off slips must accompany all applications for sub pay. Without lay off slips you cannot collect sub pay. It is the member's responsibility to make sure they get one from the contractor when laid off. Your application cannot be submitted without one. It is the contractor's responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive SUB benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register bi-annually: March 1 through March 20 and September 1 through September 20. If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

SHORT WORK WEEK SUB PAY: If you work 16 hours or less in a week or have a short work week due to weather you may collect sub for that week but only if it is at the beginning or the end of a layoff. You may NOT collect if you are not laid off. You must complete a sub application at the hall, provide a pay stub for that week and the hall will submit it to the fund office. If you are not laid off and it is due to weather the company MUST provide written documentation that it was weather related.

MEMBERS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM: If you are experiencing problems in your family, marriage or relationships, stress or emotional difficulties, grief or loss issues or problems with alcohol and drug use please contact our assistance program. Ongoing projects in our jurisdiction that may require additional manpower include; Clements Electric - Liberty Bridge (short calls) and 7 Mile Grow Facility in Bay City as well as Kalitta Air's new hanger in Oscoda. Conti Corporation – multiple projects in Midland's I-Park as well as the grounding and bonding at Michigan Sugar in Bay City.

Nelson Electric - GM Powertrain work starting Labor Day thru the end of the year. Swan Electric – Multiple DTE natural gas pumping stations throughout Zones 1 and 2. J.Ranck Electric – continuing work on phase 1 of the SK Siltron semi-conductor chip manufacturing facility, the second phase of which is valued at over 300 million and slated to kick off in January 2023. Goyette Mechanical continues PFAS filtration and mitigation work in Oscoda.

Countyline Power has secured upcoming wastewater treatment facility work at Sagining Eagles Landing in Standish, multiple pump stations in the Mt. Pleasant and Clare areas, MDOT Welcome Center remodel in Clare, and runway lighting at Gladwin Airport.

Bay City's Karn 3 & 4 seems to be remaining operational until 2031, which will likely lead to multiple electrical projects this Fall. Robinson Industries in Coleman plans to rebuild facilities damaged in their recent fire, our contractors are expected to secure that work and hire late this year. Northpointe Distribution Center (Frito Lay) will be awarded shortly, signatory contractors are likely to secure the electrical

Projects that are currently bidding include East Tawas Wastewater, Bay City State Park Welcome Center, Mio DNR Field Office, and Soaring Eagle Reservation Education Center, all of which are Prevailing Wage projects. Midland City Hall and

Isabella County administration buildings re-lighting projects and the Oscoda Holiday Inn Express are also out for bid.

Future projects we are keeping an eye on include Ascension Emergency Room, Waiting Area and Medical Office Building in Standish, Ascension Birthing Center in Tawas, North Peak Brewing in Bay City, and further De-sugarization Process upgrades at Michigan Sugar.

Rest assured both organizers and myself are working very diligently to secure whatever work is being bid in our jurisdiction for our membership. Detroit, Traverse City and Lansing may soon have calls getting into Book II if you are looking to travel. Please contact the hall if you would like to sign any books.

with the hall before performing their work in Local 692. This is a welcome development as it prevents organizers from making additional trips while policing our large jurisdiction. The easiest way to ensure that contractors are adhering to portability standards is to issue portability referrals to eligible traveling workers. This allows assessments to be paid to Local 692, as they should be. Also, if a contractor is porting the maximum number of employees allowed under our Agreement, they will be required to utilize 692 members to perform any additional work. Bottom line – if you are working for a signatory contactor and told to report to a job outside of your jurisdiction, check in with the hall where you will be working, every time. It's simply the right thing to do.

692 Organizers continue to visit jobsites within our jurisdiction to speak with unrepresented electricians, building relationships and making those workers aware of the opportunities that exist by joining our union. We should never lose sight of the organizing mission that guided the birth and growth of the Brotherhood. Our founders built a strong union by organizing all qualified workers, which allows us to build a higher union density and ultimately increases our bargaining power.

Unfortunately, we haven't always made the best decisions when it comes to welcoming all




