Here we go, on the roads again

It's a new term in Michigan's Legislature, and a new opportunity to propose a funding package that will permanently fund state road repairs. Raise your hand if you have heard this before.

State road workers and their contractors have been busy fixing the damn roads but not at the level of funding and activity that is necessary.

The latest salvo on the subject comes from state House Speaker Matt Hall (R-Richland Twp.) who released a \$3.1 billion plan on Jan. 16 to fund road work without raising taxes. Much of the money would be transferred by canceling "legislative earmarks" and corporate incentives from the state's budget - both of which have been popular with lawmakers on both sides of the aisle. "Roads and infrastructure are top priorities, and our budget choices should reflect that," Hall said.

For her part, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer on Jan. 15 pledged to "work with anyone to find a solution to road funding" and negotiate a bipartisan plan in 2025. Her office said the governor's bonding plan has spent about \$3.16 billion per year since she has been in office but that bond ends this year.

Rob Coppersmith, executive vice president of the Michigan Infrastructure & Transportation Association (MITA), which includes union contractors, said "we appreciate Gov. Whitmer's calling for action to fund and fix Michigan's roads and bridges. For decades, Michigan has underfunded critical road and bridge construction. As the governor said, we are facing a funding cliff at the end of 2025.

MITA said if \$3.9 billion more is set aside for Michigan's roads every year, it would put the state on a path toward having its streets in "good" or "fair" condition.

Potash, salt mine get \$1.2B from feds

Michigan Potash on Jan. 14 announced that it had secured conditional commitment for a \$1.26 billion federal loan guarantee to build a mine in Osceola Co. to extract fertilizer potash and table salt.

"If finalized," said the company, "the loan guarantee will help make Michigan a leader in potash production, creating 1,400 construction jobs and reducing U.S. dependence on foreign countries for critical minerals."

The loan commitment from the Department of Energy came in the waning days of the Biden Administration. More than a decade in the making, the project would yield 800,000 tons per year of potash - and the Michigan deposit is said to be among the purest in the world. Currently more than 90 percent

of U.S. potash is imported. Michigan Potash said the mining facility, to be located near Evart Twp., about 25 miles southeast of Cadillac, will be one of the most energy-efficient in the country, by using emission-free electricity sources while perpetually recycling about 90 percent of all water within a closed-loop system.

State environmental permitting rules remain to be addressed for the project.

ROYAL OAK – The trades are preparing a new culinary school for Oakland Community College.

Barton Malow is managing the \$75 million project, which is located at Main Street and East Seventh Street, and is a three-story addition to the site's existing OCC building.

The new space will house OCC's award-winning Culinary Studies Institute, slated to open for the fall semester this year. We visited the project last summer, and went back for an update last month.

Trump puts workers' rights in limbo with NLRB dismissals

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The National Labor Relations Board the agency tasked with protecting workers' rights in the workplace – has been rendered powerless by President Trump. And the NLRB may remain immobilized for the duration of Trump's term in office.

On Jan. 27 Trump fired two key leaders at the NLRB. He let go General Counsel Jennifer Abruzzo, whose position has the vital task of bringing cases before the NLRB. Appointed by President Biden, her term was supposed to end in July.

More alarmingly, Trump fired NLRB member Gwynne Wilcox, another Biden appointee whose term was supposed to end in 2028. NLRB positions are protected by federal law, which states that board members can only be fired "for neglect of duty or malfeasance in office, but for no other cause,"

The NLRB would be at full strength with five members, which traditionally include a three-member majority from the current administration's party and two from the minority party. But with previous resignations, the firing now leaves the NLRB with only two members, both Republicanappointed, and a lack of a quorum to perform any actions.

"President Trump's firing of NLRB member Gwynne Wilcox, the first Black woman to serve on the board, is illegal and will have immediate consequences for working people," said AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler. "By leaving only two board members in their posts, the president has effectively shut down the National Labor Relations Board's operations, leaving the workers it defends on their (Continued on Page 3)

No traction, again, for the nation's unionization rate

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. union membership was essentially flat from 2023 to 2024, as the rate was in keeping with the decades-long, even or lower trend for organized labor.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported on Jan. 28 that there was "little movement" in the nation's union membership rate, as it fell from 10.0 percent in 2023 to 9.9 percent in 2024. In real numbers, there were about 169,000 fewer union workers from 2023 to 2024, out of the total 16,023,000 unionized workforce last year.

"Despite high public approval ratings and an increase in union representation elections at the National Labor Relations Board, the overall union membership rate in the U.S. has continued to decline, reaching a record low of 9.9 percent in 2024," said the Center for Economic and Policy Research.

The BLS annually breaks down the numbers between private-sector and public union employees. The private sector's union penetration fell by 0.1

percent (-184,000 workers) to a record low of 5.9 percent, while the share of unionized public sector union numbers fell 0.3 percent (but saw an increase of 15,000 union members, indicating slower growth relative to total public employment).

To raise the prospects for greater union numbers, the AFL-CIO has repeatedly called for passage of the PRO Act in Congress, which would greatly ease the organizing process for unions when it comes to dealing with anti-union employers. But passage is just about impossible without a filibuster-proof 60-vote Democrat majority in the Senate, a Dem majority in the House, and a union-friendly president.

The union news was a bit better for Michigan, where total union membership in 2024 grew to 13.4 percent of the state's workforce, a gain of about 16,000 union workers, or a 0.6 percent increase. That amounts to about 639,000 unionized workers in Michigan.

Michigan's 13.4 percent union penetration in 2024 was No. 11 among the states. Atop that list was Hawaii (26.5 percent), New York (20.6 percent) and Alaska (17.7 percent).

And when it comes to the bottom-feeders of the list for statewide unionization, one's eyes are always drawn to South Carolina, where the Palmetto State is perennially the lowest. But surprisingly, between 2023 and 2024, the virulently antiunion state saw their unionization rate increase from 2.3 percent to 2.8 percent. That upward push (Continued on Page 3)

Both the December and entire 2024 numbers were released Jan. 28 by the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics. It was during this time that the Trump Administration paused all federal loans and grants, then rescinded the pause

two days later. While building industry forecasts have predicted a strong market in 2025, the whiplash from the new administration caused confusion in construction and across other industries, unsure of what the pause meant.

Dig this: buried lines are often wrongly marked by utilities

Miss Dig might need glasses. A new survey of utility contractors found that nearly twothirds of buried line strikes during the past year occurred because the lines were at least 2 feet away from where they were marked by utilities prior to digging.

The information came Jan. 16 in the results of a survey released by the Associated General Contractors of America. AGC officials said the results made it clear that even though contractors are using the 811 system, utility companies need to be timelier

and more accurate in marking the locations of their lines.

"Contractors are doing their part to make sure they avoid striking utility lines while they are working," said Jeffrey Shoaf, the association's CEO. "But it is hard (Continued on Page 4)

Unions stand up for everybody

What is a person's labor worth? What about their skills developed across years of training and life's hard-learned lessons?

Is it worth a wage that can support a family or buy a home? Is it worth health care you can rely on or dignity in retirement? Is it worth the basic protections Social Security and Workers Compensation Insurance offer? Does it make a difference when that worker's labor creates wealth, defines communities and creates the foundation for our shared economic strength?

These aren't hard questions to answer, yet many in the construction industry go to remarkable lengths to remain willfully blind to the answers. It isn't a mystery why that is. In a world where a 2x4 costs what it costs (and price increases are readily accepted), shortchanging workers is too often seen as the easiest path to undercut fair competition and crush the bottom line to pad corporate profits.

The result is an industry plagued by enterprises that chase new and creative ways to exploit workers in order to win the game. But construction isn't a game, and exploitation has very real consequences for workers – and all of us.

Imagine taking a job and getting hurt only to learn that because your employer doesn't consider you an employee, you don't have workers' compensation. Imagine working for years only to learn you will never be able to count on even Social Security because you were caught in the various schemes to misclassify employees as independent contractors – never mind that you always reported to the same boss and did what you were told.

The rest of us pay the price when the 39 percent of construction workers who earn too little to support themselves have to rely on public assistance just to get by. Or when they get hurt and have to fend for themselves in emergency rooms, driving up the cost of care for everyone – such as when a teenager fell off a roof in Traverse City and was dumped at a medical center.

That teenager also serves as an example of how the drive to exploit workers fuels illegal immigration and outright labor trafficking as the logical next step in a race to the bottom. Immigrants are easier to exploit and have fewer protections. Some contractors even go so far as to put their trafficked workers in debt for the thousands of dollars owed to the labor brokers who facilitate the journey across the border.

So, what do we do about all of this? In the union building trades, we start by arguing that a person's labor is worth what we call an area standard wage. That is, the wage collectively bargained in good faith between workers and contractors in a geographic area for a defined scope of work. It informs prevailing wage requirements and is one of the best ways to short-circuit exploitation and ensure workers are paid what they are worth without adding to the cost of projects.

But that's not all we do. We work to support apprenticeships that train an efficient, productive workforce. We advocate for policies that protect workers and improve the health of our industry. We shine a light on illegal exploitation wherever we find it. And we stand up for the men and women who build the world around

Make way for union organizing

Today (Jan. 28) the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) released its annual report on union density, showing that the percentage of workers in a union remained flat in 2024 despite huge organizing wins across the country and across different sectors of

It's plain as day that more working people want a union now than at any point in our lifetimes. Across our economy and in every part of the country, workers are standing together to demand fair treatment, better wages, and dignity and respect on the job. Our organizing has resulted in remarkable victories in traditional and emerging sectors like manufacturing, health care, clean energy infrastructure, retail and restaurants, hospitality, and on college campuses, in technology, in public service and much more.

Today's BLS numbers don't begin to tell the real story of the desire workers have to join a union. The number of union elections has doubled since 2021, boosted by efforts from the previous Biden administration to give workers a fair shot at joining a union.

In 2024 alone, there were nearly 1,800 union elections, with workers winning the vast majority. Many of these victories are not reflected in the numbers released today because employers are exploiting a broken system to delay bargaining a first contract. But these wins – including an election for the first-ever Whole Foods union in Philadelphia just last night – are proof positive of working people's incredible desire to join and form unions.

Public approval for unions is at a nearly 70-year high because in an economy that continues to heavily tilt to the wealthy few, and leaves workers behind, the only way to get ahead is by joining

The recent successful organizing campaigns at places like Starbucks, Amazon, Volkswagen, and other massive corporations show workers' momentum and hunger to join unions, no matter how many hurdles bosses and anti-union politicians throw our way. There are 60 million workers who would join a union today if given the opportunity, but between broken labor law and corporate bosses like Elon Musk and Jeff Bezos engaging in often illegal union-busting every year with little consequence, far too few get that chance. It's time for change.

We call on the Trump administration to live up to its campaign promises to support workers by prioritizing fixing America's broken labor law through the Protecting the Right to Organize (PRO) Act and the Public Service Freedom to Negotiate Act. These bills would finally update our archaic, broken laws and give workers what we so desperately want: a free and fair shot at joining a union on the

Our focus is simple: organizing and ensuring every worker in America who wants a union has the freedom to join one. Many unions are experiencing an all-time high in membership and continue to grow. The AFL-CIO is now nearly 15 million members strong with the recent affiliation of the Service Employees International Union, the most unified labor movement we've seen in decades. This year, workers will continue to organize vigorously, flex our power through strikes and other workplace actions, and demand that corporate CEOs and politicians give us the respect we deserve.

inspections. A lot of our tradespeople have been here since the beginning, and they have done very well for us.'

Working with Senior Supt. Joe Frincke, Czerny said there is a multitude of tasks being undertaken in what is a complex, and relatively compact 78,400 square-feet of space. Work is proceeding on pulling wire, setting up switchgear, tiling bathrooms, drywall finishing, plumbing, and various sheetmetal installations, among numerous other tasks.

The completed space will have a multitude of kitchens, and the associated water supplies,

drains, sinks, ovens, exhaust, stainless steel fixtures, and complex electrical hookups, wiring and properly placed power out-

"The biggest challenge here has been the logistics, the tight space and the complexity of the job," Czerny said. "it's a very dense job, with multiple types of kitchen equipment being installed, and a lot of just-in-time deliveries. There are just so many details in all the spaces."

Ground was broken on the addition in November 2022, adjacent to the existing OCC building at the site. The space will feature three classrooms,

two demonstration kitchens and four teaching kitchens, providing space for collaborative learning among students, and is promised by OCC to be "one of the top culinary learning facilities in

OCC says "the new facility will also feature a 2,372 squarefoot restaurant on the third floor with a sloping ceiling, large glass windows and 360-degree views of downtown Royal Oak, known for its hospitality, cuisine and vibrant culture. The restaurant will offer the community a new dining option where culinary students will prepare and serve fine-dining recipes as part of their training.'

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


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BUILDING MICHIGAN: Timberrr! HISTORY IN THE MAKING



THE SAWMILL at the mouth of the Dead River in Marquette, in 1905. Sawmills were usually sited at the mouth of Michigan rivers, allowing logs to be floated in their direction. The timber would then be cut, bundled and moved by railroad or ship to other Great Lakes ports. Mill workers were paid more than forest-based loggers, but had to pay their own room and board. Changes in lumbercutting technology drove major efficiencies. In the 1860s steam power came into play, and by the end of the 1870s virtually every mill operation had been mechanized to some degree, according to Lumbering in Michigan. The first circular saws of the 1860s had wide, wobbly blades, producing miles of sawdust. Thinner blades soon arrived, then bandsaws, which eliminated the poorer quality cuts of their predecessors. Trees were an unavoidable natural resource for settlers as they entered our state's Lower Peninsula in the early 19th Century.

Trees grew in abundance and unimpeded, except perhaps for the work of beavers - all over both of the state's peninsulas, from when the glaciers receded to when White settlers began to seriously populate Michigan.

"The pioneer settlers of the 1820s found a land covered by dense stands of virgin timber; scarcely 50 years later, Michigan was the leading lumber producer in the nation," says a history provide by Michigan State University's Project Geo.

At first, settlers to Michigan cursed their presence. The trees impeded overland transportation, and the effort to cut them down and remove their stumps in order to create farmable land required an extraordinary amount of labor. But the felled trees did provide lumber for building shelters.

"The earliest lumbering in Michigan was done by the French in order to build forts, fur-trading, posts and missions," Project Geo said. "The British, and later the Americans, used Michigan's hardwoods to build merchant and war ships. Beginning about 1855, white pine became the most desired tree species by the lumber industry of the Great Lakes states. Navigable rivers and extensive pine forests formed the basis of a flourishing pine industry in Michigan's Lower Peninsula until 1895, and about 10 years longer in the Upper Peninsula."

The first group of people to set up lumbering operations were from New England. The forests there were almost entirely cut, so the owners and experienced crews followed the work. "Timber cruisers" would search for the best available land, and reserve it at the local land office for their employers. The Michigan land was incredibly cheap, selling for as little as \$1.25 per acre.

"By 1840," wrote Maria Quinlan in an article for Michigan Technological University, titled Lumbering in Michigan, "it was apparent that the traditional sources of white pine in Maine and New York would be unable to supply a growing demand for lumber. Michigan, the next state west in the northern pine belt, was the logical place to turn for more lumber.

"The first commercial logging ventures in the state utilized eastern techniques,

capital, and labor, but Michigan lumbering soon expanded beyond the scope of anything previously known and established itself as one of the state's most important industries."

Winter was the preferred season to fell trees: they could be cut and slid over snowy or icy ground to rivers, awaiting a springtime trip to be floated to sawmills.

According to the National Parks Service, Michigan's vast Eastern white pine forests were popular with the loggers because logs floated easily, or could be assembled into rafts and transported over the open lakes. Denser hardwoods like maple could not as easily be felled, and rapidly dulled the saws in the mills. Early on, the unmarketable hardwoods were often burned in local kilns to make charcoal for iron production.

"Three Michigan inventions of the 1870s were responsible for increasing the transportation of logs regardless of the weather," said the National Parks Service.

"The first of the innovations called 'big wheels,' was invented by Cyrus Overpack of downstate Manistee. These 10-feet diameter wheels were pulled by a team of oxen or horses and allowed rapid movement of logs without the need for snow cover. The high axle clearance easily allowed the wheels to move over stumps and rough clear-cut ground."

Prior to the big wheels, the logs were normally "skidded out" with oxen or horse teams to the main logging road. There they were loaded onto sleighs and hauled over ice roads to river banks where they were stored until spring.

The ice roads were also primarily a Michigan innovation. The unique roads were made by running a sprinkler over a logging road during frigid nights. By morning, the normally rutted and rough trails were turned into sheets of ice. During the day heavy sleighs loaded with logs could rapidly move over them.

"The migration of loggers, sawyers, rivermen, and investors in timber from Maine to Michigan, then to Wisconsin, Minnesota, and the far West played a vital role in the development of significant portions of the nation," said *Project Geo*. "One writer on the American frontier states that Michigan had nine times as many varieties of trees as Great Britain, but he fails to note that one of them was the white pine, the lumber from which was highly regarded because of its beauty and the ease with which it could be worked."

"The 'shanty boys and the 'timber (or lumber) barons of the lumbering era were some of the most colorful characters in Michigan's history," Project Geo continued. "Tales of the lumberjacks' prodigious strength and of the company owners' opulent houses and manner abound, but the lumbering industry produced more than songs and legends. A vast amount of housing in the Midwest was constructed of Michigan timber....'

Project Geo said by the 1870s there were more than 400 sawmills and 800 logging camps in the Lower Peninsula, mostly in the pine region which extended from the Saginaw valley and the Muskegon area north to the Straits of Mackinac. Many individual sawmills in 1882 were producing between 10 million-20 million board feet of lumber per year. The industry grew rapidly from the 1850s through the 1890s, encouraging the settlement of the state's northern regions and development of a wood products industry.

The Saginaw Valley was the leading lumbering area between 1840 and 1860, when the number of mills in operation throughout the state doubled. The state was also crisscrossed by a network of rivers which provided convenient transportation for logs to the sawmills and lake ports. By 1869 Michigan was producing more lumber than any other state, a distinction it continued to hold for 30 years. At one time, the Muskegon River floated more pine logs than any other stream in the world.

By 1900 most of the pine in the Lower Peninsula was gone.

Pine logging in the Upper Peninsula began to assume importance in the 1880s and the virgin stands lasted until about 1920. Much U.P. hardwood was used to fire iron ore furnaces, and by Henry Ford in Model T body production. His company owned about 500,000 acres in the U.P. The peak of Michigan's great timber harvest was reached in 1889-1890 when mills cut a total of 5.5 billion board feet of lumber, mostly pine.

In an era with few environmental considerations, the intensive logging wrought havoc on the state's landscape. Re-forestation was not yet a thing and massive swaths of land remained fields of stumps. Farmers eventually cleared much of the land and where the soil was appropriate, used it for agriculture.

Trump puts workers' rights in limbo with NLRB dismissals

(Continued from Page 1) own in the face of union-busting and retaliation. Alongside the firing of NLRB General Counsel

Jennifer Abruzzo, these moves will make it easier for bosses to violate the law and trample on workers' legal rights on the job and fundamental freedom to organize."

Abruzzo's forced departure was not unexpected: Biden, immediately after taking office four years ago, set the precedent by firing Trump's general counsel, who had a strong anti-worker

The political football with the NLRB could have been anticipated, and its highly likely to end up as a case before the U.S. Supreme Court. During Biden's term the NLRB was widely seen as shifting toward being proworker, frustrating the business community. But in the latter part of 2024 the NLRB came into the crosshairs of Trump crony Elon Musk, who along with other business leaders like Amazon's Jeff Bezos, challenged in court the constitutionality of the agency.

Trump hasn't played his hand on whether he will fully staff the NLRB – but not doing so plays into the wishes of the likes of Musk and Bezos, who have gone to court to make the agency simply go away.

The *OnLabor* blog pointed out that Trump's strategy "as some have speculated," could include "outright refusing to appoint members to the NLRB. Such a move would hamstring labor law enforcement and be extraordinarily tricky to challenge in court."

Said Wilcox after her dismissal: "As the first Black woman board member, I brought a unique perspective that I believe will be lost upon my unprecedented and illegal removal. I

will be pursuing all legal avenues to challenge my removal, which violates long-standing Supreme Court precedent."

But having a 3-2 majority on the NLRB that's from the president's party is a precedent and a tradition – not a law. Trump could theoretically pack it with five Republican appointees, or perhaps not fill them at all.

"A working National Labor Relations Board is a critical forum for workers to bring forward their case when their employers have broken the law or abused their rights," said Laborers International Union General President Brent Booker. "With these firings, the NLRB will not be able to do business until successor members are confirmed - putting an immediate halt to hearing cases that need immediate attention. We urge President Trump to fill these vacancies as soon as possible with leaders who will put the interests of workers first ahead of big business and protect the rights and safety of our members."

'The simultaneous firing of Abruzzo," writes Harold Meyerson for the left-leaning American Prospect, "who's been the most pro-worker federal official since New York Sen. Robert Wagner (who authored both the National Labor Relations Act and the Social Security Act in 1935), means that the Board not only can't rule on any employment issues but also that its local attorneys who investigate employee and employer complaints no longer have a senior counsel who sets their priorities and policy.

"In Wilcox's and Abruzzo's stead, we're left with a labor law of the jungle, which enables employers to run as roughshod over their workers as their little pocketbooks desire."

"The cost of living has gone up, so we reached a little deeper this year to help an organization that does some great work," said Jeremy Haviland, a business representative with Michigan Painters District Council 1-M - Local 2352.

Care House has interviewed 11,300 victims since it converted an old house in 1996 into a facility for the purpose of helping domestic violence victims.

"You may not know the magnitude of what these cards mean to us," said Care House Executive Director Dorie Vazquez-Nolan, to the business reps. "We very much appreciate the contributions."

She handed out a flyer which described how the cards are used, including the aid they gave to a child and his new custodian last year.

"A young boy came to Care House for an emergency interview due to allegations of physical abuse by his mother. The boy's adult brother stepped in to take custody of the boy. The brother indicated financial hardship due to taking his brother in. The brother reported that he is in the process of obtaining a birth certificate for his brother to begin the enrollment process for school, buy clothing and school supplies as the child was homeless prior to coming into his care.

"Care House provided gift cards for him to purchase clothing, school supplies and other items to assist him in caring for the child."




Following are some facts and figures gleaned from the latest BLS numbers:

• The Center for Economic Policy and Research said public sector unions have taken a major hit after Covid. While the overall workforce share of workers who were union members dropped by 0.3 percent from 2019 to 2024, "the losses have been especially dramatic in the public sector," the CEPR said. That sector's union membership dropped 1.4 percent during that five-year period, from 33.6 percent to 32.2 percent, a loss of 41,000 public union workers. While membership was mostly stable in the federal government, declines were greatest at the state and local government

- While union membership density among Black workers dipped slightly between 2023 and 2024, it has increased by 0.8 percentage points (+250,000 union members) between 2019
- and 2024. • Men continued to have a higher union membership rate (10.2 percent) than women (9.5 percent).
- Nonunion workers had median weekly earnings that were 85 percent of earnings for workers who were union members (\$1,138 versus \$1,337).
- ·Among occupational groups, the highest union membership rates in 2024 were in education, training, and library

occupations (32.3 percent), protective service occupations (29.6 percent), and construction and extraction occupations (15.4) percent, down from 16.3 percent in 2023). Membership rates were lowest in farming, fishing, and forestry occupations (1.5 percent) and in sales and related occupations (2.7 percent).






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

Sixty-four percent of survey respondents reported that the utility lines they inadvertently struck during the past year were at least two feet outside of where they were marked by locators after they called 811 – that's the nationwide number construction firms and anyone else planning to excavate are required to call in advance.

Shoaf noted that construction firms are doing their part to use the 811 system. According to the survey, 99 percent of firms report they are using the 811 system before starting excavation work. And 95 percent report they are aware of local laws governing the use of the 811 system.

year and plan to hire as a result," said Jeffrey Shoaf, the Associated General Contractors' CEO. "But possible federal funding pauses and efforts to curtail lawful work authorizations could impact future hiring plans for many firms."

The Dodge Construction Network reported that total construction project starts decreased 2 percent in December to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$1.2 trillion.

But for the 12 months ending December 2024, total construction starts were up 6 percent from the preceding 12 months. Residential starts were up 7 percent, nonresidential starts were up 4 percent and nonbuilding starts (usually infrastructure) rose 7 percent over the same

Interest rate cuts "prior to December supported some momentum in multifamily and commercial starts over the month," said Sarah Martin, associate director of forecasting at Dodge Construction Network. "Sustained labor shortages and elevated materials prices will continue to add risk to the sector, in addition to the concern over tariffs and more strict immigration enforcement. Overall, the strength in the value of projects in planning and further Fed rate cuts should encourage growth in construction in 2025."

Plumbing Law Changes: Starting March 20, 2025, anyone performing plumbing work in Michigan must either be registered and in good standing with the State as a plumbing apprentice or hold a current journeyman or master plumbing license. The new legislation also establishes a ratio of one journeyman for every two apprentices, with significant penalties, including steep fines and the suspension or revocation of a plumbing contractor's license for non-compliance.

This is excellent news for our industry and presents a great opportunity to expand our market share in West Michigan. Make sure that your license or apprentice registration is up to date with the State. 





Conti Electric has projects that are ramping up inside the I-Park (Dow) and also has work at the Karn Generation Facility.

Escon continues work on a nice project at Mersen USA in Bay City's south end and is slowing down some within the I-Park.

Superior Electric has a new line out to Bay City Powertrain along with a cooling tower project. An open Job call remains for this project.

Zone 2 contractors have been bidding and securing a fair amount of work, doing a great job of keeping their crews busy.

and sources to tell you what you want to hear. And sometimes opinions masquerade as facts so well that we don't recognize them for what they are: opinions, not facts. We're not espousing conspiracy theories, but rather that old saying, "consider the source."

players, and each develop their own lingo and mystifying rules. AEPC can't undo the complexity of this system, but we earn trust by being transparent and accountable about how we create value for benefit dollars.

Our prescription drug plan, for example, negotiates with pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) to come up with overall low pricing and improvements in quality.

We dive deep into what works for our members and reject the generic headlines that reduce healthcare into a series of bad guys and good guys, as has recently been the case with PBMs taking heat that is not all deserved.

What's Your Responsibility?

This is the part that isn't rocket science, but still remains extremely difficult. Stay well. Eat right. Exercise. Don't smoke. Get annual health screenings and stay connected with friends and family. But as is often the case, the devil is in the details. What, exactly, does it mean to "stay well?"

To some, a fundamental distrust of traditional medicine distorts ideas of wellness, from opposing vaccines, to touting the benefits of raw milk, to claims that even young children should take dubious supplements to improve health. While science has not answered every question or foreseen all consequences of medical breakthroughs, leaning into scientifically unproven answers, especially those that emphasize fear and scathing accusations, holds potential for harm.

Rejecting vaccinations, for example, has created the foundation of a sicker society. Polio, which was essentially eradicated for decades, has resurfaced, with a case in the U.S. in 2022, and 190 cases worldwide in 2024. An increase in measles cases tracks with lower rates of child-hood immunizations. Complications from measles can be dangerous, including brain damage, blindness, and may weaken the immune system against other infections.

Who Do You Trust?

It's often said that trust is earned, but even that truism has had trouble standing against the tide of so much media offering different versions of "truth." Essentially, the emphasis is on sowing doubt rather than building something better.

Being a skeptic isn't a bad thing, in fact raising doubt has often paved the way for finding solutions. But focusing on doubt makes it nearly impossible to trust anything – even when facts are available.

Going forward, we will be challenged to change systems affecting our lives, and especially our healthcare. You may not always hear the answers you want, but real trust withstands that. Those we trust won't always be 100 percent right, but they are 100 percent in your corner and constantly in search of a better way forward. Seek out trustworthy voices and do your part to thoughtfully engage with the information you get through any source.

Members working for a contractor who may be looking to hire additional laborers are urged to call the Union Hall and help a brother or sister get referred out to work. The next time, it may be your name on the list when that call comes in for work.

Referral List: Every member who is looking for work must call or come to the Local Union Office on Mondays between 1-4 p.m. to put their name on the Out-of-Work list. You must have an Out-of-Work skills sheet filled out and on file in order to be referred out for work by the Local Union. FYI: It is the Member's responsibility to regularly notify the Local Union of any changes to his/her skillsets. It could mean the difference of being sent to work or not!

Roll Call: All members on the out-of-work list must reregister every quarter within the first five days of the following months: March, June, September and December. Your failure to do so will result in your name being removed from the referral list. *Example: If your name is on the list in April and/or May and you don't reregister by June 5th your name will be removed from the list.

Drug Test Renewal: Members are reminded to keep your Yearly Drug Test current and also your 18 safety modules. You can schedule an appointment to take your modules at our training schools located in Perry, Wayne, St. Joseph, or Iron Mountain by calling (517) 625-4919 or by visiting the training school website at www.mltai.org to schedule appointments for modules. You can also contact the Local Union office at (313) 894-2241 to use a Local Union computer to complete required modules.

Training: Check out the training classes available to you at no cost. Journeymen and Apprentices may still obtain training through MLTAI's online training at https://lms.mltai.org. Types of training you can take include, but are not limited to: OSHA 30, Asbestos Awareness, Silica Awareness, Infectious Disease Awareness, Respirator Awareness, Hazard Communication, Blood-borne Pathogens Awareness, and Lead Awareness. The above training and certifications are all available at the training center. By taking the OSHA 30 your 18 MUST Safety modules are updated as well. If you are not able to go to the Training Center for MUST Safety Modules contact the Local Union to assist you with making arrangements to complete them.



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
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Outdoors Great Lakes fisheries survey

Every year from April to November, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources is on the Great Lakes, surveying the important and diverse Great Lakes fisheries. Crews from research stations in Marquette, Charlevoix, Alpena and Harrison Township gather data on fish populations, fish health and the presence and effects of invasive species.

It's vital information that directly informs fisheries management decisions - such as stocking levels or regulated catch limits – and provides data to help gauge the success of past actions.

With surveying for 2024 wrapped up, DNR fisheries biologists are now synthesizing the findings and preparing for next year's surveys. Check out highlights from each research station's survey efforts.

Lake Superior and northern Lake Michigan. The crew of the research vessel (RV) Lake Char began work on Lake Superior as soon as the ice melted and continued through early November. The Marquette Fisheries Research Station's work focuses on lake trout, though species studied this year also included lake whitefish and burbot.

Data from the spring 2024 Lake Superior surveys showed a slight increase in adult lake trout populations in nearly all areas. The summer juvenile lake trout survey indicated slight increases in recruitment (reproduction and survival) on the west side of the Keweenaw and Munising areas and a slight decline in all other locations, with stable populations overall. During the field season, 257,100 feet (48.7 miles) of assessment gill net was deployed for these surveys at 123 sampling stations across the lake.

The RV *Lake Char* surveyed waters around Isle Royale in spring to assess the status of lake trout populations around the island. The crew also conducted surveys in the deepest waters of Lake Superior (and all the Great Lakes) – about 1,320 feet

and then surveyed nearshore lake trout spawning reefs near Munising in early November. Nearshore Great Lakes fisher-

ies assessment work from Upper Peninsula ports involved 10 miles of trawling in Lake Michigan's Little Bay de Noc and Big Bay de Noc. In addition, over 25,000 feet of survey gill net was used in four conducted at eight ports this year. locations in northern Lake Michigan and two locations in southern Lake Superior. Catch data from these fall surveys provide useful metrics for assessing fish community change and populations of species including walleye, yellow perch, smallmouth bass, northern pike, lake sturgeon and invasive Eurasian ruffe.

Lake Michigan. Three surveys accounted for the majority of the Great Lakes survey work for the Charlevoix Fisheries Research Station staff and the survey vessel (SV) Steelhead in 2024.

Since 1997, the DNR has participated in a spring gill net survey, in collaboration with other Lake Michigan agencies. The objective is to assess recreationally,

ment efforts for multiple species

in Lake Michigan. Due to the broad area covered and multispecies focus, this survey provides the most comprehensive information on the status of adult Lake Michigan fish populations.

The spring gill net survey was Across all ports, more than 100,000 feet of experimental bottom gill net was deployed and provided data on more than 5,000 fish.

From late August to early September, the SV Steelhead and crew conducted the prey fish survey, a multi-agency effort measuring the abundance of alewife, rainbow smelt, bloaters and other prey fish throughout Lake Michigan. This survey uses hydroacoustic (high-precision, recordable fish finder) gear. Results inform research and interjurisdictional trout and salmon management around predator/ prey balance and lower food web changes in Lake Michigan, including the lakewide "predatorprey ratio" analysis to ensure prey fish can support the lake's salmon and trout populations.

The hydroacoustic survey comprised 25 sections spanning nearshore and offshore regions around the basin. Despite challenges, preliminary results suggest relatively similar densities of age-1 (1+ years old) alewife and higher abundances of bloaters compared to previous years. However, young-of-year alewife abundance was estimated to be very low in 2024.

The SV Steelhead crew completed the annual bottom trawl survey in September and October at three of the ports sampled during the spring gill net survey (Saugatuck, South Haven and Grand Haven), as well as at the port of Pentwater. Ten trawl samples were collected at each port. This survey provides information on the overall status of the nearshore fish community, including the presence, range expansion and effects of invasive species, and the status of yellow perch recruitment.

Charlevoix Fisheries Research Station staff also used small vessels for targeted surveys in 2024. Staff assisted Central Michigan University researchers with scuba surveys of mussel populations in large rivers and continued a multiyear assessment Lakes waters of southeast Michi-

of spawning reefs in northern Lake Michigan.

Lake Huron. The 2024 field season for the Alpena Fisheries Research Station and research vessel (RV) Tanner began in April with the annual spring lake trout assessment. The crew surveyed 14 locations in U.S. waters of Lake Huron from Drummond Island to Port Sanilac to determine the abundance and distribution of both young and adult lake trout. The catch rate of adult lake trout was similar to that of recent years, and most young lake trout (both hatchery-reared and wild-born) continue to be collected in northern Lake Huron.

Following the conclusion of the lake trout survey in late May, commercial fishery sampling in June, and tending Great Lakes Acoustic Telemetry Observation System, or GLATOS, receivers for fish movement studies in July, the RV Tanner completed a sonar and trawl survey of outer Saginaw Bay that targeted cisco. Cisco are important Great Lakes species that help maintain healthy predator species and provide fishing opportunities, as well as serve as an indicator of ecosystem health. Because of this, cisco are a focus of ongoing restoration efforts by multiple natural resource agencies around Lake Huron.

In the fall, the RV Tanner crew completed the annual Saginaw Bay fish community survey. This survey is done each September and survey catches showed a high abundance of young-of-year walleye in the bay (the second highest on record!), and adult walleye gill net catch rates that were similar to recent years' numbers. However, both gill net and trawl catch rates of adult yellow perch in Saginaw Bay remained very low. A highlight of the survey was an encounter with two juvenile lake sturgeon, confirming their survival from ongoing stocking efforts in the Saginaw River system.

Soon after departing Saginaw Bay, the RV Tanner once again made its way to the eastern Upper Peninsula for an annual fish community survey in the Les Cheneaux Islands, where the gill net catch rate of yellow perch increased, and other indicators of perch population health were within sustainable ranges.

St. Clair-Detroit River System. The field season in Great gan kicked off with northern pike, mooneye and smallmouth bass tagging in Lake St. Clair and tributaries during March, April and May. The tags, which are surgically implanted into fish and send a signal to receivers in GLATOS, allow scientists to track movement of fish throughout the region and the Great Lakes as a whole.

While data from northern pike and mooneye tagging is still coming in, the results from smallmouth bass tagging suggest that Lake St. Clair smallmouth bass exist in multiple, smaller subpopulations rather than one large lakewide population. These subpopulations occupy well-known areas of the lake such as Anchor Bay and the Mile Roads and appear to mix very little with smallmouth bass from other locations.

The annual lake sturgeon assessment in the North Channel of the St. Clair River showed continued recruitment of young lake sturgeon into the adult population – which means that young lake sturgeon are surviving into adulthood. The North Channel sampling location is considered a "hot spot" for young lake sturgeon, and this is supported by DNR survey data.

In 2024, the DNR tagged 24 juvenile lake sturgeon in the North Channel with tags that are detected by GLATOS (like the northern pike, mooneye and smallmouth bass mentioned above) and more will be learned about the specific movements and habitat use by these fish in the coming years.

The 56-vear-old RV Channel Cat made a weeklong trip to Lake Erie in early August to conduct a bottom trawl survey that documented walleye and yellow perch reproduction and an abundance of 8-inch and larger yellow perch.

The RV Channel Cat and crew then returned to Lake St. Clair to collect lake sturgeon using 35 individual trawl tows. The individual sturgeon captured in this survey, which sometimes exceed 100 pounds, are rarely encountered in the North Channel survey efforts. The RV Channel Cat closed out the year with a trip to Lake Erie in early October for the annual walleye assessment. Catch rates in the survey gill nets were the third highest observed since 1992, and the catch included many year classes (ages) of fish, which represents strong walleye reproduction in Lake Erie since 2015.

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
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
